

Three options for deploying cameras:



In the local area

- Ask permission from land owner
 - Security

Avoid Humans



Beware of plant growth





Attach the camera to something sturdy

Choose the height carefully



Check for signs and trails





Be careful of pointing towards sunset/sunrise



CHECKLIST

- ✓ Memory card empty
- ✓ Secure and fastened
 - ✓ Check and record date and time (deployment and collection)
 - ✓ Make sure it's on
 - ✓ Leave it out for a week at least

Setting up your camera trap





Undo side clips to open camera trap

'On', 'Off', 'Test' switch



Turn catch to / open and close

Battery compartment

Indicates 'camera' or 'video' mode

Battery remaining

Press menu to change settings





Set to 'camera' mode to take images



Use 'Set clock' to enter correct time and date



Remember to set it to GMT/UTC all year round

Use arrows to change time and date shown (Beware of American date format!)






Photo No. should be set to 3

Interval should be set to 1 Min






Exit settings by pressing 'Menu'

Test your camera by pressing 'shot' to take a photo

View your photo by pressing 'OK/Replay'



Delete your photo by pressing 'Menu' then 'OK'

When you are done slide the switch at the bottom back to 'Off' until you are ready to deploy your camera in the field!
